

History Group St. John Ambulance Hall Thursdays (weekly). 2 – 4 pm

It has been good to see encouraging history lectures in October, and this is greatly appreciated. On 5th October, Carol Wilson introduced us to the part played by the Knights Templar in the history of Westerdale - most intriguing and unexpected. Clearly a lot has changed in the intervening 800 years or so, and yet signs can still be found of the influence the Knights had in Westerdale.

On 12th October Rick Harwood picked up on the theme of his previous talk, Shadowlands,

and "disappeared" communities in Britain, by expanding on it both geographically and ecologically. In a wide-ranging and thought-provoking talk, he took us from Eliot's "The Waste Land", through examples of ghost landscapes of his own experience and from Cal Flyn's book, *Islands of* Abandonment. These included an abandoned gold mine in Namibia, the Five Sisters of West Lothian, the deserted French village of Oradour-sur-Glane left as a memorial to horrors perpetrated in World War Two and the more familiar memories of the abandoned town of Pripyat in Ukraine following the Chernobyl disaster. These "islands" were abandoned for different reasons but also subsequently changed in different and sometimes surprising ways. Current concerns caused by climate change were put in context too – was it a kind of global warming that caused the abandonment of Ur of the Chaldees in the 22nd century BC? Nature may find ways to recover from catastrophes if humans avoid getting in the way! Or can humans actually assist nature in avoiding catastrophe? Food for thought indeed....

More food for thought, in a different way, was provided by Richard Appleton on 19th October when he speculated on how differently things might have turned out in Britain if events had followed a different course in 1066. Thanks to Richard and to Joyce Stangoe for her fascinating further insights on "More

Whitby Yards" on October 26th. Many thanks also to Marjorie Thomson's sons for the launch of *If Whitby's Streets Could Speak* at the conclusion of Joyce's talk. This collection of Marjorie Thomson's lectures on the local history of Whitby to the History Group is now available to purchase in the Save the Children charity shop on Flowergate. Its sales will benefit a cause that was dear to Marjorie's heart.

For the second lecture of the session, Dag Kjelldahl gave a thorough exposition of the remarkable achievements of the maverick Roald Amundsen who not only was the first to locate both the North and South Poles but also the first to traverse the elusive North West Passage across the north of Canada/USA.

Speaking with the benefit of his own experience of Arctic conditions, Dag stressed that Amundsen learned from the Inuit how to cope with the extreme conditions encountered in trying to reach both Poles, and also was prepared to be

innovative in the use of new technologies such as airships. This was a fascinating and informative introduction to undoubtedly one of the greatest explorer/adventurers of the 20th century, accompanied by many photographs illustrating both the achievements and the hardships involved.



The next lecture will be November "The Return Overland Expedition Singapore UK" when Graeme Aldous will return to follow up his muchon appreciated presentation last March about the 'First Overland Expedition to Singapore by Land Rover'

If Whitby 's Streets Could Speak

Most Thursday afternoons around 40 members of the Whitby Whalers History group meet to hear talks given predominantly by the group's own members. Topics covered involve both local and more general areas of history. For more than 10 years, up until she died in 2020, Marjorie Thomson was the leader and organiser of this group. Aside from her authoritative presentations she was also responsible for encouraging people to present on topics they were interested in. If Whitby's streets could speak, the title chosen by her three sons, is a small selection of the lectures Marjorie delivered to the group over a period of two decades. Having been born in 1929 Marjorie was writing these talks in her seventies and eighties; the date of her lecture on Whitby in the Civil war – September 2019, was the month of her ninetieth birthday. As her sons state in the book's introduction its unsurprising, then, that she occasionally and perhaps without realising it speaks not only as a historian but as a witness. Her sons also comment that one theme, which particularly comes through the lectures in a way that may strike readers as very much of the present moment, is championing the women in the stories she recounts. She finishes the Saint, the Soldier and the Sage (three Whitby men) with none of the three men who form the ostensible subject of her talk but with Saint Hilda and defends this on the grounds that none of these men come anywhere near our greatest Whitby woman. Also commented on in the book's introduction is that in a curious way world events, which happened long after the talks were written, have lent them richer meaning. It is hard not to think of the controversy surrounding Brexit, undreamt of at the time of writing, in Marjorie's account of the equally passionately contested though now very distant debates of the Whitby Synod (Our One and Only Venerable). Besides her lectures, Marjorie's other principle public involvement in Whitby, during a long and very active retirement, was with the Save The Children charity shop, which she set up and ran until her death. In one way or another she worked for Save the Children for over sixty years. All the proceeds from If Whitby's Streets could speak will go to Save The Children. The book was launched at the History group on October 26th and is now on sale for a minimum price of £10 at The Save The Children shop on Flowergate. Upcoming Whitby u3a history talks include 'The Walmsley's of Robin Hoods Bay", "A History of Yorkshire Cricket" Two sides of a coin "and "A History of Sandsend"
