Barrow to Baghdad and back again

April 3

Philip Caine's talk had a different approach to our recent talks. It was a very personal account of his life in the oil industry first as a chef and later providing accommodation for workers.

He'd been born and grew up in Barrow where the shipyard was the biggest employer and the most likely destination of all young men of the town. His parents expected that for Philip, but he had other ideas. He wanted to work in the hotel and catering business in which he'd been working in the evenings and at weekends while at school. He did manage to convince his parents that this was his preferred option. This decision shaped the rest of his life. He started working as a chef in various hotels around the country, including Claridges. He then switched to working as chef on North Sea Oil Rigs which involved a 2 week-on/2 week-off rotation work

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pattern. He didn't like working on the rigs but the good money and work rota kept him there for 17 years. He decided he was getting too old for the rigs and wanted a change.

He then shifted to organising accommodation for ex-pat oil workers which took him to Algeria, Nigeria and Kazakhstan. The latter involved organising his supplies with the help of the KGB and the Russian Mafia. This began to sound like an Ian Fleming novel!

Philip had decided to go into business for himself and borrowed money to build and run a hotel for the oil industry workers. He unfortunately chose a bad moment to get into debt since he got caught out by the ENRON banking collapse and he had to find other ways to pay off his loans. The solution was to go to Baghdad and build accommodation for US Troops. On the one hand, this was a safer option since he was on contract and not using his own resources. On the other hand, it wasn't so safe since he was shot out and experienced mortar fire when he set foot outside of the Green Zone. However, after 7 years he'd paid off his debts and was looking forward to retirement. However, that was put on hold since he'd clearly impressed someone who asked him to set up a similar facility in Dubai. He accepted this challenge – in part because his wife could join him. They stayed there until 2014 when they returned to Barrow to enjoy retirement.

However, Philip got bored with sitting at home, so his wife suggested that he took up writing. He joined a writing group. Surprise, surprise his experiences in the Middle East Oil Industry gave him plenty of material to convert into stories. He couldn't find a publisher for his first book, so being the sort of enterprising guy he is, he set up his own company. He's now the author of several thrillers and gives very entertaining talks including to Wirral u3a. He also generously donated one of his books to our draw.

Radio Caroline North

17 April

Brian Cullen gave us a very interesting talk with music of the period and interviews with the Disc Jockeys.

Brian was born in Birkenhead and listened to Radio Caroline as a youngster.

He worked freelance for Radio Merseyside and Radio City. He is currently broadcasting "Radio Caroline Flash Back" which is a 24hr programme on the internet.

In the 60's there were only the BBC Light and Home services until Radio Luxemburg obtained a license to broadcast at night. Ronan O'Reilly was promoting Georgie Fame and took an acetate to Radio Luxemburg because the BBC would not play it, but they

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laughed saying they could not play it as they had a waiting list booked for 5 years. As it happens, a Danish Passenger ferry was decommissioned and was taken to Rotterdam. The boat was then taken to Greenall to be refit by Ronan O'Reilly and Radio Caroline was born. Called Caroline after President Kennedy's daughter but at the same time the Fortunes brought out the song "Caroline" and this became their theme tune. Simon Dee and Chris Moore tested the transmissions and when the press arrived, they sailed away to transmit in international waters 4 miles from the coast, anchored off Harwich. Their first record was by the Rolling Stones.

A rival pirate ship broadcast as Radio Atlanta but in July 1962 they merged as Radio Caroline South and Radio Caroline North. Radio Caroline North sailed to the Isle of Man and stayed there for 4 years, through all sorts of weather. DJs who joined included Tony Blackburn, Johnny Walker and Emperor Roscoe. Local lad Mike Ahearn took a bus to London and was interviewed and started the following week.

There were a lot of commercials, and Brian played us some: Weetabix, Vitalis, Vicks cough drops and Findus Frozen peas.

In 1968 the Government set up Marine Legislation to outlaw the ship, so many decided to leave as they did not want to break the law. Ronan decided to keep the ship going but it was never as popular.

They broadcast illegally until 1969 when it was towed away to Holland and eventually decayed. Brian was at pains to reiterate that Radio Caroline still broadcasts on Radio Caroline Flashback. The interviews with the DJs were very interesting and the snippets of 60's music took us back to our youth. Do you remember the 60's? Then perhaps you weren't there!!

Inviting all members from the Northwest to Part 1 Influencing and Social Change Training Part 1: An introduction to Influencing and Social Change (in-person) on Tuesday the 20th of June 12:30-16:00, Quaker Meeting House, Liverpool.

What is it about? Influencing and social change encompasses all the work being done across the u3a to support members, and the movement more broadly, to use our combined voices and get involved in our communities about issues that matter.
