

Bene 'n' 'ot



The green bottle was unusual, green with a long neck and on the front an embossed red seal and the letters D.O.M.

My grandfather poured himself a small glass of the amber liquid, sniffed, took a sip and with a nod of the head offered the glass to me. I sniffed and took an apprehensive sip. Sweet, sticky on my lips, tingling on my tongue, I swallowed. A warm feeling crept down my

throat and warmed the very middle of me giving a cosy inside glow. I was about 7 years of age.

My grandfather lived in the Burnley area where much of the Benedictine sold in this country is consumed, why? During the First World War, the East Lancashire Regiment was stationed near Fecamp in Normandy where the liqueur is made. Being readily available, it soon became a favourite with the troops especially with hot water as it warmed them up and they brought this tradition back with them.

At Burnley Football Club, the very same "Bene 'n' 'ot" is still sold as it has been for over 100 years. The club can sell up to1500 bottles in one season alone. As a child at the football matches, I never knew of this but as an adult, in 2019, I sampled this for myself – delicious, I recommend.

PS Benedictine is also an ingredient in a Singapore Sling.
