Local History Group visit Broughton Castle.

The Local History Group went on an interesting visit to Broughton Castle in July. The castle is really a house, and it's in a beautiful setting in the Oxfordshire countryside near Bloxham. We were able to explore both the Castle, which is surrounded by a moat, and grounds, during the afternoon, even venturing as far up as the roof, which boasts amazing views across the surrounding area. The manor house itself dates back to 1300, but in 1406 crenellations were added, from which time the House became a Castle.

William of Wykeham, Bishop of Winchester, and well known around these parts, bought the house in 1377. It then passed down through his family until a granddaughter married Sir William Fiennes, and it's remained in this family ever since.

Our trip ended up in the Castle tearooms where some of us enjoyed a cream tea, very nice!

The Castle is open on Wednesdays, Sundays and Bank Holidays from April to September.

Cookery Corner.



Between us, our members surely possess a cornucopia of favourite seasonal or local recipes for food and drink. Here's one to get us going for August: Victoria Plums in Wine (ingredients for 6)

2 lb firm Victoria plums
3 oz caster sugar
½ pint medium dry sherry or Madeira wine
2 tablespoons toasted flaked almonds



Dissolve the sugar in ½ pint of water and simmer for 10 minutes. Stir in the wine and bring the syrup to a simmering point again. Add the plums, one at a time, to the simmering syrup. Cover the pan with a lid and leave for 10 minutes.

Lift out the plums with a perforated spoon and put them in a serving dish.

Boil the syrup until it has reduced by one-third and thickened slightly. Pour over the plums. Scatter over the flaked almonds.
