
Outings

Military History and Aviation







At last, as COVID restrictions recede, we are cautiously proceeding with our relaunch at 2 p.m. on the 6th of April 2022. The venue will be **St Peter's Hall, Woodhall Spa.** After that we will meet on the first Wednesday of every month with the exception of July and August. Readers will be aware that we combined the Military History Group with the Aviation

Readers will be aware that we combined the Military History Group with the Aviation Group after the retirement of the very successful Military History Group Leader, Malcolm Perks, and the introduction of COVID restrictions. We are pleased that Malcolm has remained a member but, as a combined group, we will miss the cosiness he created in the Cottage Museum Community Room. We will be meeting in St Peter's Hall where we are hoping that milder weather will enable fresh air to circulate without undue discomfort. The group will continue to present Military History as before, but modern history topics will be more influenced by aviation which has played its part in all theatres for

just over 100 years. We will, however, not ignore pre-aviation naval and military history.

We will start our season with a personal and emotional eye-witness account of the Falkland's War as we approach the 40th anniversary.

The story starts with the Advanced Naval Battle Group diverting south from exercises off Gibraltar in early April 1982 and takes the audience though the seaborne preparations for, and the early execution of, Operation CORPORATE. It concentrates on the Type 42 Destroyer HMS Glasgow, along with sister destroyers Coventry and Sheffield, but opens out to include all elements of battle.

We have a healthy membership and are also able to accept occasional guests from within the U3A Membership. So, if you find the subject being discussed is of interest, please turn up by 2:00 pm. We will just need to add you to the day's register and request £2.00 for the refreshments.

Five Mile Walking

Culverthorpe

The walk in March was a classic spring walk. We ventured out to Culverthorpe to enjoy a landscape of gently rolling hills bathed in sunshine and blues skies, with fluffy white clouds. In the far distance were the scattered villages of Lincolnshire with their tall church spires.





Spring had definitely sprung. The hedgerows were either in blossom (blackthorn) or sprouting green (hawthorn).

Jan and Bob Smith, the walk leaders, showed us a profusion of primroses in Heydour churchyard, the snowdrops in Culverthorpe Park, and there were young lambs in the fields.

The original gardens have been simplified but the façade of a family chapel and graves remain. Yet it is a man made landscape.

The lake below the 17th Century house was produced by damming the stream. Much of the surrounding landscape was once parkland and trees have been planted to enhance the view. What once was pasture has become arable and there was discussion about agricultural price increases and their effect on farming practices.

Despite the good weather it was noticeable that the ground had retained the recent rain, and where the path followed the stream it was quite muddy. Returning to start across the grounds in front of the Hall it was agreed what a pleasure it was to stroll in such quintessentially English countryside.

Home Computing for Fun

What's it All About?

When do we meet?

The group meets from 2-4 pm on the first Friday of each month at the Parish Council Offices, 17 Stanhope Avenue, Woodhall Spa.

What is our aim?

To help people become confident in using any device, whether desktop computer, laptop, iPad, iPhone, smart phone or tablet. To help people recognise scams and advise on security. To illustrate the functionality of any device.

What happens at the meetings?

We have fun. We learn new things and share knowledge. I help with IT related issues and promote confidence using devices. We explore new things. I answer questions and give advice on safety and scams. The meetings remain informal and relaxed.



How do we do this?

We have demonstrations and 1:1 tutoring. We chat, not always about technology! I produce factsheets for home use. We problem solve. We occasionally have fun quizzes. You don't have to participate; you can just listen.

Who can join?

Anyone. Absolutely no IT or technical knowledge required. Even if you have no digital devices and would like to know more about them.



Your monthly guide to what it means....

PDF stands for 'Portable Document Format'.

PDF

Essentially, the format is used when you need to save files that cannot be modified but still need to be easily shared and printed. Today almost everyone has a version of Adobe Reader or other program on their

computer that can read a PDF file.

This format is used by organisations when sending your documents that you would want to save or print, for example policy documents or invoices.

Your u3a Newsletter is produced as a PDF.

You can save your documents into PDF format:

- 1. Open the document you want to save as a PDF
- 2. Click the File tab
- 3. Click Save As (choosing Save As keeps your original version and allows you to save an additional copy in another file format.)
- 4. In the File Name box, enter a name for the file if you haven't already
- 5. Click the dropdown arrow in the Save as Type box and click PDF (*.pdf) If you don't see this as an option in the menu, make sure you have the free Adobe Reader software installed on your computer.
- 6. Click Save.

Important: Once you have saved a document as a PDF file, you cannot convert it back to a Microsoft Office file format without specialized software or a third-party add-in. This isn't an issue if you have used the Save As option as you keep your original document as well.


Web Browser

We just call a Web Browser or Internet Browser a Browser these days.

Examples of Browsers are Microsoft Edge, which is standard with Windows 10, Google Chrome, Firefox and Opera. They all provide various levels of functionality and security, and there are many more.

The purpose of a browser is to get content from <u>the Web</u> and display it on a <u>user</u>'s device. This process begins when the user types a URL (<u>Uniform Resource Locator</u>) or an address, such as https://woodhallspa-u3a.org.uk into the browser.

You can also use the address bar to search for something if you do not know the URL. If you type in a name or item it will open up a search page with suggestions and links to websites.

Virtually all URLs on the Web start with either https:, which means the browser will retrieve them with the Hypertext.com/HTTPs. In the case of secure mode (HTTPS), the communication between the browser and the web server is encrypted for the purposes of security and privacy. This is a safer option, particularly if you intend to input personal date onto the website.

Web pages usually contain links called <u>hyperlinks</u> to other pages and resources. Each link contains a URL, and when it is <u>clicked</u> or <u>tapped</u>, the browser navigates to the new resource. You should only click on these links on trusted websites.

Most browsers will remember your visit using an internal <u>cache (storage)</u> of web page resources to improve loading times for subsequent visits to the same page. You can choose to clear this information when you leave the website with an option in your browser settings. There are other options to manually clear this cache at any time.

Using your browser can be impacted and slowed by several things:

- Errors on the webpage
- Wrong URL entered
- Website cache cleared from last visit
- Device performance eg. Low memory
- WiFi or network issues

Poor WiFi or network problems being the most common.

Every browser has settings that you can use to tailor your browsing experience. These are normally accessed on a menu by clicking on the three dots on the top right of the browser.

Chilly to start but by the time we came begin the walk the sun was out and the temperature rising. A really good turnout with 18 walkers lining up at the start line.

We carefully walked past the notice that said 'Parking for Hall Users Only' and made our way out of the car park. Apparently we had been told it was OK, but don't mention my name!



We walked through Nocton and past the gate lodge for the old RAF hospital Nocton Hall, this was closed some years ago and is now a care home, the hall itself is derelict following the devastating fire there in 2004.

Further down the lane we spotted this sculpture made from agricultural tools and a few other bits.
Unfortunately I can find no further info about it, does anybody have further info?

Continuing through woodland on one side of the lane we had the cricket pitch and on the opposite side the church. We didn't have time to walk around the church but form a distance it looked to be quite picturesque. It is said to be a typical estate church and has been described as a 'rather mean affair.'

Now walking in woodland, through the fence, we could see the derelict hospital buildings of Nocton Hall.

At this point we noticed that the leader was setting a cracking pace and the rear-enders, as usual, were engrossed in their surroundings/conversation and lagging behind, somewhat!

Coming out of the woodland we were still on metalled road and we met with the estate road, which was rather busy with tankers moving from one part of the estate to the other.

Leaving the road we were on to what looks to be a new track that takes walkers past the new crew yard of the estate. With the size and number of new buildings and the amount of equipment lying around the yard it is fair to say that the owner is not short of a bob or two! Stopping at the entrance gate we took a break across the road from Nocton Wood. Here an information board gave information about the wood, its history and the wildlife within. We were now in sight of Wasps Nest.



Walking down Abbey Hill we crossed Car Dyke and entered the metropolis! Where did it get its name? There is an explanation, or more of a guess, that the name Wasps Nest came from the pub that used to be in the hamlet. But that raises the obvious question of how did the pub get its name? Possibly inspired by the landlady?

The phone box has been converted into an information centre, table and chairs outside, and for those that like to strut their stuff, a glitter ball!

Here we learned that Wasps Nest had been quite a centre of activity several years ago.

Smiths Crisps had set up growing potatoes there.





A potato railway belonging to Nocton Estates is known to have existed along the route from Wasps Nest to Dunston Fen Lane, and then from there to the former Garden Farm. Its gauge was 1ft 11.5". Methods used to work the railway were horse, steam engine and diesel engine. This was just part of a larger railway that was 23 miles long in total. Evidence of the railway was found when a new water main was put in a few years ago.

From here we walked along the road with Car Dyke to our left. Within a short distance the road went round to the left and we carried straight on crossing Car Dyke again and following a track alongside a tributary across the fields.

This took us back to Nocton through a new housing estate.
