Such invisibility is dangerous. It leads to exclusion from the workforce, money worries, growing homelessness, bad health outcomes, abuse and silence and inaction in social policy.



She turned this on its head and used it as a cloak of invisibility to do things "inappropriate" for her age. She became a street artist.



A Happy New Year to Everyone from the Reading Group




Our November book was Commonwealth by Ann Patchett. Set in California and Virginia, the novel tells the story of two divided families. Divorce results in the children of both families living together through the summer and the death of one of them has a traumatic effect on all their lives as they grow up. The heroine of the book is Franny and her relationships with her step siblings and divided parents weave through the whole book.

The book is a challenge – a contemporary American novel which appears difficult and rather 'alien' in some ways.

American language and life are uncomfortably strange. But Ann Patchett is a renowned woman author and the reviews for this book are very good.

The plot is convoluted but well-crafted with a large cast of characters and time switches that add to the reader's confusion. Feelings about the book in our group were mixed.

Then in December, the discussion was centred on Act of Oblivion by Robert Harris. It is 1660 and Colonels Whalley and Goffe sail for the New World. They are among the regicides wanted for complicity in the murder of King Charles the First. Richard Nayler is charged with bringing the traitors to justice and will stop at nothing to find them. The Colonels embark on an epic journey in a strange land, from one community to another as they find sympathisers willing to shelter them. A substantial bounty hangs over their heads.



Robert Harris is a master storyteller, and this book is set predominantly in America. It is a story of religion, fanaticism, vengeance, and power. A great piece of historical fiction of turbulent times. The group thought it was very well written, and very well researched, though somewhat let down by an unimpressive ending however satisfying. A very good read, at times atmospheric, and at other times extremely chilling. Highly recommended.



There is a description in Act of Oblivion of how the Roundhead army faced the enemy and moved forward with legs locked together. Three members of the group tried it. I feel we would undoubtedly have lost the battle!

New Year, New Interests

If you have a smart phone, tablet or iPad you may have only made use of the applications (apps) that came pre-installed on it. You might have only used your phone for calls, texts and emails, and maybe taking the odd photo. You may have even used the browser to surf the internet.

However, there is so much more that you can do, and you might even develop a new interest. Here are some ideas for free app downloads that should be available via the Play Store (Android) or Appstore(iPhone/iPad):

Merlin

This app comes in handy on your countryside walks. It can help you to identify birds by sound, appearance, or description.

Footpath Route Planner

Basically, does what it "says on the tin". Shows footpaths wherever you are.

Libby

This app gives you a digital connection to your library membership (you can join if you don't have one). It then gives you access on your device to borrow books, including audiobooks.

BBC Sounds

This app allows you to listen to any BBC radio content including music, sport, drama and podcasts. You do need a BBC login to access the content.

Photo editing software to crop, enhance or edit your photos.

A useful genealogy site to help you build you family tree.

Sew & Sew

Bev has completed her first quilt, which is beautifully modelled by her first grandchild, Rafe, who looks very pleased with it. I understand Bev has already started on her next quilt.

I have completed another lap quilt for my sister-in-law's significant birthday. This was well received as she is a big William Morris fan so she loved the Morris-designed fabric. Looking at the photo makes me wonder whether a lap quilt with built-in-slippers may be the next big thing!









Joan has completed a beautifully bright quilt for Poppy. Often with guilts, the front is the main feature with lots of piecing, and the back (backing) is usually relegated to being a single fabric. Most quilting cotton is only approx. 44" or 112cm wide, so if the quilt is intended to be wider than that, lengths of fabric need to be sewn together to create the required width. There are extra-wide fabrics available but the choice can be limited.



Joan has ingeniously resolved this dilemma by re-purposing a duvet cover as backing, to make a quilt that is as interesting and vibrant on the back as the front. I think Poppy will be delighted. Continued
