We thank Lesley Cummings our membership secretary who organised for eight of our members to attend basic First Aid training, at no cost to Woodside (long story), also for all the work done that

keeps the membership records secure and well organised and her husband Andrew for maintaining our Website.

Bernice Caffrey, our Study Group Co-ordinator, held a very rewarding meeting for the Study Group Contacts (SGC) where policies and current issues were among the agenda items. These are important yearly meetings and I urge all SGCs to attend where possible. Structure, Governance and Financial Review

Woodside U3A is an unincorporated member association governed by a Constitution originally adopted in January 2017 and varied in June 2018. It is a member of the Third Age Trust, the national body for U3A's. The Committee, who are the Trustees, are appointed by the membership at each AGM. The Committee is able to fill any vacancies between AGM's.

The Accounts show an adequate end of year balance and as the Charity is a member organisation meeting expenditure by annual membership subscriptions it does not have a policy for holding reserves.

Objectives and Activities

The objects set out in the Constitution are:

The advancement of education and, in particular, the education of older people and those who are retired from full time work by all means. including associated activities conducive to learning and personal development.

The Charity meets these objectives in two main ways as already mentioned - by providing the framework within which members can establish and run, within guidelines set by the Committee, a number of study groups covering a range of interests and subjects and by holding monthly general meetings of members at which talks are given on a variety of subjects. The trustees have regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit in providing and overseeing these activities which enable members to learn in a way that encourages them to work together, sharing and developing their knowledge and skills, whilst also helping to combat social isolation.

Chauvet Caves painting dating back 30000BC. Many outlines of the animal gives the impression of a herd.



This painting by Holbein, 'The Ambassadors' painted in 1533 appears to have a strange wood-like item (bottom centre). In fact if viewed from the side you can clearly see a skull. A reference to the turmoil ranging in Europe at the time - The Catholic Church challenged by Martin Luther - perhaps.



This Lego 'terracotta army' has been drawn onto flat tarmac. This illusion can only be seen from this side. The people in the background can make no sense of what we can see.

Environmental Study Group

Our group of six having once signed in at the BRE reception, with the help of the BRE phone-app, we began exploring the site. BRE has a world renowned reputation for building innovation and problem solving tricky problems experience by both people nationally and globally, since being established in 1920.

Our first location was a house that had incorporated flood prevention technology, and one wonders why such homes are not build on flood plains or adapted in flood risk areas, given the level security provided not to mention the cost savings both on insurance and government emergency funding when such disaster strikes. Next door was a most exciting project house 'adaptation for dementia', needs to be seen as minor changes add quality of life in homes where people are living with this condition and their partners and carers. We then mover to building 16 an impressive purpose build office block, made of 80,000 re-used bricks. The interior was build to afford maximum natural light, thus reducing energy consumption along with under floor heating and cooling system comprising a magnificent waved ceiling.

We then visited, examples of emergency and sustainable housing provision for developing countries where BRE worked in partnership with Red Cross and Red Crescent and Engineers without Borders, along with other charities, it was impressive work. Moving on, we rambled round to what was describe as ZEDpods , which can be placed in car parks, without hindrance to those parking. The double bedroom occupancy is fitted and kitted out with environmentally friendly utilities and ideal starter home. Constructed off site and erected in a matter of hours, such pods, seem a worthy contender for mass provision of homes for our young people.

Within the time left available to us, we looked at family show houses designed and built without the need for fossil fuel utilities, which relied upon solar and digester energy, harvesting rainwater, homes well insulated and planned to maximise natural light, with average yearly energy costs at £280. His RH Prince of Wales 'project house' was stunning from the exterior but the living areas were cramped and to most of us a disappointment. From here we walked through the bluebell laden woods which are now classified as a heritage site as it is home to the

mini mock Mohne Dam, used as the experimental location for trialling the 'bouncing bomb' made famous during WW2 by the dam busters. Here our self directed learning tour ended, unfortunately by this time the cafe was closed. We thank Linda for downloading the app that assisted our learning and ability to navigate the beautiful grounds on such a pleasant spring afternoon. BRE is well worth a visit, the combination of shared projects both Nationally, in Europe, specially Holland and Germany as well as Internationally, is a credit to such British business, the innovation and inventiveness is quite breathtaking as it paves the way for future generations to live without damaging the environment, as it promotes living in harmony.

The members of our Photographic group visited the "de Havilland Aircraft Museum" at London Colney on 4th June. The purpose of the visit was to take photographs of aircraft and related items and for each member to choose a photograph to be displayed at our next General U3A meeting on 18th June.



The visit was very interesting and we were able to photograph and enter a wide variety of aircrafts including the Comet, Trident and the original two engine Mosquito. The site was opened in 1939 and it was here that the iconic de Havilland DH98 Mosquito was designed and prototypes built. This aircraft was built from wood to make it light and at that time it was the fastest aircraft around, even faster than the Spitfire and all German fighter aircraft. It was so fast that the bomber version did not need armaments since no other aircraft could catch it.

The Museum is located near to Junction 22 on the M25 and a visit is highly recommended
