## 2. Editors Notes (with a bit of Membership Secretary knowledge)

This issue is mostly to do with our future. The planned holidays, trips, and social events in 2024, and the management of our branch and its activities in this, and the following years.

In "Notes from the Chair" John Dollimore points out that probably for the first time we do not have any volunteers for officers and other committee posts, and that "we are in a precarious position".

From the membership data I believe that in April our numbers will be between 600 and 650. That means:

- a) only 1% of the membership is needed to form an effective six member committee on a rolling basis. **As of April we do not have that.**
- b) We need 10% to 15% of the membership as group leaders on a rolling basis for continuity of activities. **As of now, we do not have that.** Many individuals are managing more that one group.
- c) the good news is that we have volunteers that make social events a success, setting up the facilities required and providing the catering. **But again, we need to ensure the continuity of volunteers.**

This is proving to be a most useful exercise that is **currently 55% complete**. From these inputs we are building a list of those people that are offering their services as potential volunteers. We have not forgotten about you, and when we have completed the data gathering activity those **potential volunteers will be contacted and invited to a meeting to move the process on to the next stage**.

The responses are showing up errors such as,

## 6. Activity Reports

6.1. February talk . Circled in the Radio Times – John Osborne 1st Feb 2024 (Georgette Vale)

This was a very entertaining performance, moving, poignant and humorous. Wonderfully written with delightful phrases. It was essentially a play, a solo performance, which John was inspired to write after finding a stash of copies of the radio times after his grandfather died.

His props included a cardboard box representing grandfather's TV with the coat hanger arial and the little-girl-and -clown test-card. The actual TV had "Four channels and twice as many colours."

John began by giving us a few of the poems from his new show, Norwich a Love Story. Perhaps we will have that next year.

He then went on then went on to explain how his childhood was shaped by visiting his grandparents in Stockton on Tees. A legacy of cosiness. He beautifully described the quirks of a family as seen by a child. Ozzy the three-legged dog that ate Jaffa cakes, (Grandmother worked for McVities). The local sweet shop where the lady had fingers that were stained pink from strawberry bonbons.

That was also the shop where Grandfather bought his radio times every week. Except for the one copy of TV quick which obviously had not gone down well. Some missing weeks were tracked down to when Grandfather was in hospital or away spending Christmas with his family.

The era covered was mainly the 1980s. The days where if you missed a programme it was gone. The circling of the chosen programmes was done using his stash of little pens from the betting shop - strange because Grandfather was a retired police officer. Police dramas tended to be circled with a heart. Morse was his favourite, but he also liked A Year in Provence because it also had Morse in it (well - John Thaw) and beautiful scenery as well

Some letters were picked out. One expressing discontent about the Archers because the affair between Brian and Caroline had come out of the blue. Someone was also complaining that To the Manor Born was wrongly named.

We were thoroughly drawn into this performance. He said afterwards it is 90% autobiographical but with some bits changed for, well let's just say 'artistic licence'. And it worked. We were all taken back to the days when TV was simpler, and we loved hearing about the relationship between the boy and the grandfather.

## 6.2. Visiting Norwich Group

St John The Baptist Roman Catholic Cathedral was our destination on 27th February, our brilliant guide was Dr Richard McGuire, who explained the following and more.

Originally the building was a Parish Church, built in 1882-1910, designed by George Gilbert Scott, and paid for by The 15th Duke of Norfolk, Henry Fitzalan Howard. Later to be consecrated in 1976 as a Cathedral. Two Chapels are dedicated to The Duke of Norfolk and his wife, Lady Flora Abney Hastings. Both were devout Catholics.

We were given a simple explanation and understanding of what Catholicism is as a religion. We saw inside a confessional box and were shown the modern sound system which replaces the Bells and organ for the Services.

The design is basically Gothic with a wooden roof, with East to West direction, the main Altar is in the East and contains three saintly relics, there are another twelve relics in the different Chapels in the Cathedral.

We climbed a circular stone staircase in the West Transept to an open space that was designed originally for the organ, which was never installed because the money ran out.

The bosses on the main roof graduate from Adam and Eve to Jesus at the East end, above the main cross.

Another circular stone staircase took us to a secret room in the East Wing, from which we could see down the side of the building, the wooden roof, and an Ariel View of the East End.



Most of the amazing stained-glass windows were made in the 1800s by an English company, who have their original designs even today., and they were all removed in the Second World War, being returned, and replaced after. They all tell stories of each of the Chapels, all contain Saints.

A very interesting and informative tour, enjoyed by all.
