
After the tour of the changing rooms we moved upstairs to the top floor of the stand via the middle floor to use the director's toilet facilities.

Plantation Garden Tour 22nd February 2023

We were met by Ruth Liss from the Plantation Gardens Preservation Trust, who bought a colleague to help with the tour.

The weather boded rain, but apart from an occasional drip it stayed fine for once.

The gardens are an ideologically dream of one self made man, called Henry Trevor, originally an upholsterer, who over 40 years in the 1800s, spent vast amounts of money and time designing the amazing space.

The Quarry which houses the gardens had been left to neglect and overgrowth during the last century, to be rediscovered, by Bryony Nierop-Reading, an employer of the council, the Council then funded the restoration, to give us its present state. Today the Trust employs one Gardner, who oversees many volunteers, and they and the Trust are proud of their forgotten garden.

It is a quiet, peaceful and fascinating place with gargoyles, wall sculptures, a Venetian Bridge, high walks, remains of a Palm House, Fountain, and many seating areas to enjoy lunch on a sunny

day.

Report on last month's Speaker - Martin Lloyd

"Becoming a Famous Author"

That title was a bit tongue in cheek - but the talk was about becoming any sort of author. Martin told us that one in four of us either has written a book or wants to write a book someday. He did say that at school he was good at English - but was told writing wasn't a proper job, so it took 17 years before he could get anything published.

He talked about the creative side of writing i.e. having the ideas and planning it all out, and then there is the mechanical side - getting to grips with typewriters and later the computer systems which are a blessing and a curse. He strongly advised using a dictionary because if you use a word wrongly it remains there for all to see.

He told us that 95% of books are rejected by publishers without even being read. At least these days you don't have to pay the postage. He sincerely recommended getting hold of the Writers Handbook. You need to know the competition – and certainly you need to know if anyone has done anything similar to what you are planning to write.

It is not what you know - it is who you know. Different publishers want different things. They have their own teams of people all pulling in different directions. Publications dates are not what they seem either. I was surprised to hear that the bit of blurb on the back of the book is often the bit that is written first.

We heard about the awards and prizes in the field and the minefield of getting your name out there. The big window displays in places like Waterstones cost an awful lot of money. Martin was somewhat scathing about local bookshops.
