Hawes is a magical little market town in the heart of The Yorkshire Dales National Park. The award-winning *Wensleydale Creamery* is home to the world-famous Yorkshire Wensleydale cheese. The creamery has a lot to thank Wallace and Gromit for. The animated duo helped to increase production when sales were slowing. Nowadays, the creamery sells a cheese named after them. An interactive experience takes you on a journey through the art of cheese making where you can watch Wensleydale cheese being crafted through a Viewing Gallery.

The gift shop is well stocked with locally sourced products including biscuits, sweets, crockery and other gifts. There is also a separate cheese shop, where lots of award-winning cheeses may be sampled.

Enjoy a delicious lunch in either Calverts Restaurant, which incorporates The Cheese Bar or the 1897 Coffee Shop and garden.

The Dales Countryside Museum is housed in a contemporary version of the former Hawes Railway Station. The permanent collections and temporary exhibitions are set amongst the stunning architecture of the unique gallery spaces. The displays tell the fascinating story of the Yorkshire Dales and the people who lived and worked there. It explores the social and spiritual lives of this community, which has shaped the local landscape for thousands of years.

Family History - Shaun O'Hara and Joanne Mathews (Report by Graham Lougher)

In the absence of Shaun who is on holiday, Graham Lougher led the July meeting. The BMD websites (Births, Marriages and Deaths) were explored, how to use them explained and the pros and cons of each site high-lighted. An exercise in using Lancashire BMD was undertaken, researching Thora Hird and Emmeline Pankhurst.

In the meeting on Monday, 7th August, Graham will discuss Church records (i.e. Parish Registers) on how to find Baptisms, Marriages and Burials, and where they are found on-line and at County Record Offices and Archives, etc.

To follow, our talk entitled "Liverpool Docker" will be about social history as well as family history. It will give an insight into what life was like living in Liverpool in late 1800s and more recently in 1950-60s.

At the meeting on Monday, 4th September, Geoffrey Cowell will give a talk on DNA and how it can be used in Family History research. This talk is not to be missed.

French Conversation - Clive Jones

The group now has thirteen members, our highest number ever. Our meeting schedule as published on Newsletter pages eleven and twelve, will change in September from twice a month to every two weeks. We have continued with audio podcast articles, this time on dictation competitions (a very popular hobby in France). This gives us good practise in listening, translation and discussion. Our July gathering was on a beautiful day Over Wyre. Several subjects were discussed. A problem with overgrown ivy got several suggestions, mainly organic. to bring it under control.

Next, the difficulty of finding old roses was aired, especially the true Lancashire Rose, (Rosa gallica var. officinalis). It was introduced into this country from France by Edmund the 1st Earl of Lancaster. He was the second son of Eleanor of Provence and Henry III. He brought the rose home in 1275. His mother also brought over the White Rose

of York, (Rosa alba semi-plena). We plan to take some cuttings from established plants in the hope that we can all have one of each in our gardens.

On our Harrogate trip last month, sulphur rich spa waters were pointed out. We were made aware that sulphur is one of the minerals which keeps soil acidic and is essential for ericacious plants.

Our host, John has a wisteria plant of which he is justly very proud. He had grown it over an arch, which, in time, had become a part of the plant trunk. Now, neither would be able to be moved without the other.

After such a great afternoon we never expected what came next. John had grown some plants from seeds and cuttings which were all available for us to take home. We are very lucky to have such great group.

The next meeting is on 12th September, when we return to Victorian painting. Atkinson Grimshaw, famous for moonlight urban scenes, will feature, along with John Millais.

Spain Beyond the Costas - Sue Clark

The meal was devised to celebrate the centenary of Sorolla's death. The fourteen-course tasting menu was based on the fourteen huge panels which Sorolla had painted, between 1912 and 1919, as a commission for the Hispanic Society of America.

They were called 'Vision of Spain' and depict the different regions of Spain, the landscape, costumes and traditions of Spanish life.

Thus, it was an appropriate topic for our final session, looking at these paintings which showed the great diversity between the different regions.

In the second part of the meeting, we indulged in a bit of nostalgia. We looked back at all our meetings together and our five visits to Spain. We talked about those things we had particularly enjoyed or remembered from these trips and our meetings in the last twelve years since our first meeting in 2011.

One of the key features of our walks is the distance to be covered. We try to set the routes for seven to nine miles depending upon terrain etc. At the conclusion of the walk, we compare notes from mobile phones as to the actual distance achieved. Our theme last month was 'Summer' which was a broad enough topic to depict what summer means to us all.




