#### Eat and Heat Group - Tony Ward

The Eat and Heat group has met three times and presented the results of its research and discussions to the Monthly meeting in January.

The cost increases of most concern to members were:- petrol, domestic energy and groceries.

The group would like to suggest the following simple changes that could help mitigate the increases:-

#### Car Fuel

You can access a list of garages offering the cheapest petrol prices across Blackpool, Fylde and Wyre simply by registering with petrol prices.com. Prices can vary by up to 6p per litre so, depending on mileage, members could save up to £100 per year.

#### Food and Groceries

Which regularly update their survey of national supermarkets and consistently find ALDI and LIDL to be the cheapest. The differences are significant, ALDI is around 25% cheaper than Morrisons for example.

Based on a national average of £34.4 spent on groceries per week per person this could generate annual savings of around £400. If you rely on home delivery (Which ALDI and LIDL don't offer) then Asda will give you the best deal.

#### **Domestic Energy**

Annual energy bills are expected to reach an average of £4000 by April 2024. Over half of our energy bill pays for heating our homes during winter. Turning the room thermostat down by one degree will reduce your overall bill by 10%, or £400. According to Martin Lewis at MoneySavingExpert.com it is unlikely that there will be any meaningful price competition between suppliers in the near future as prices will be dictated by the wholesale market, the regulator and government intervention. So don't bother switching. If there is nothing we can do at the point of purchase then we have to resort to home insulation better and smarter consumption. We suggest the most effective steps we can take to reduce cost, based on

#### Make your home draught proof

Stopping heat from escaping through unwanted gaps around doors and windows could help you save around £60 a year in a typical home and, if you have an open chimney, draught-proofing it when not in use could save a further £90 a year. These savings are based on a typical, gas-fuelled, semi-detached home.

#### Fit Loft insulation

Insulating your loft can save you as much as £590 a year in a detached house. Laying loft insulation from zero to a thickness of 270mm in a typical semi-detached home could trim £355 a year from energy bills, as less heat will be lost through the roof. In a mid-terraced house £330 a year. With costs around £480 for a semi-detached home, you would see the savings back in under two years.

Insulating cavity walls is more expensive but can save on average £395 a year in a semi-detached house. In a detached home you would save an average £690 a year, and in a mid-terrace you would save £235 a year.

If you have the money to do it, insulation is a great long-term investment. As energy bills go up, the time it takes to see a return on your investment becomes shorter. The Energy Saving Trust estimates that having a professional install loft insulation in a typical semi-detached home would cost around £480 in October 2022, but once it was done you would save £355 a year on your energy bills. So, in less than 18 months you would be making a saving. Professional installation in a detached home would cost more - around £630 - but the savings are as much as £590 a year.

The Group have also instigated a monthly collection point in order to supply the Fleetwood Food Bank.

The Group has concluded that further meetings be put on hold until we repeat the survey in March/April in order to assess the growing impact of price rises.

## **Family History** - Shaun O'Hara and Joanne Mathews

At this meeting, we discussed whether or not the members were prepared to put £2.00 per month, into the coffee and biscuit fund, which could be used to contributing towards the costs incurred by visiting speakers.

Everyone agreed that wasn't unreasonable and the idea was agreed by everyone.

We had one member turned up with a brick wall on her family genealogy - she couldn't get through the brick wall and had been struggling with it for a while.

We were happy to help her and she is now much further along with her genealogy!

The next meeting will be yet again 2.00 p.m. at Carlton Memorial Hall on the first Monday in February as January is a Bank Holiday.

#### French for Improvers - Christine Holt

We started our first meeting of the New Year by talking about what we had done in the weeks since we had last met. The talks centred on Christmas celebrations. Most of us had spent some time with family. Like many people at the moment, for some of us, our Christmas celebrations had been cut short because we were ill. However generally People had enjoyed themselves.

For our second meeting, we read and translated some texts. We listened to a recording of the texts which helps with pronunciation and provides new vocabulary. They were quite challenging but everyone did very well.

#### French Conversation - Clive Jones

Two meetings were held at the Thornton Library on 9th and 23rd January. The membership number is still as strong as ever and new members are always most welcome. The next two meetings will be on 6th and 20th February. We continue to focus on spontaneous French Conversation rather than by individual work or presentations, by encouraging free-flowing discussion and subsequent questions without the fear of making mistakes or drying up in the conversation. There were some excellent conversations on a range of topics including a crime drama series starring British actor

Alfred Molina (as police Inspector Armand Gamache of Sûreté du Québec) called Three Pines (Trois Pins) which is set in the Eastern Townships (Cantons de l'Est) region of the French-speaking province of Québec, Canada. Although an English-language production, it frequently goes into French dialogue with subtitles. At the last meeting we introduced an audio input from a Frenchlanguage podcast on this occasion centred on the debate about the traditions of, and how Christmas (Noël) is celebrated in France. The audio input theme will continue at the next meeting. We also discussed the celebration of the Chinese New Year Festival which took place recently, and some Frenchlanguage and English-language films and television series including Le Père Noël (a French comedy film), 1917 (directed by Sam Mendes) and Les Combattantes (a women at war series).

#### History - Susan Cox

At our meeting in January, member Mike Coyle gave us an illustrated talk of Courtfield, a legend in its own time. From 1949 Blackpool boasted one of the two finest Hotel & Catering schools in the UK. The talk dealt with the history of the school from humble beginnings until its closure in 1995. At its height 1000 students studied there and many went on to be leading lights in the hospitality industry, worldwide.

At our next meeting on 13th February, Geoffrey Cowell will talk about the Poor Laws from the 14th Century through to the first world war.

#### History of Art - Martin Johnson

A cold and damp January morning was perhaps the best time to study those Victorian Classicists who portrayed a largely fantasy life of Ancient Rome, Greece, and Egypt. Whilst admiring their technical skills and research into historical accuracy, it was agreed that the two most accomplished painters, Lord Leighton and Sir Alma-Tadema, provided the public and their rich patrons with views of an idealised and leisurely lifestyle bathed in Mediterranean sunshine. Only the beautiful and handsome peopled their canvases.

As a complete contrast, we will look at two American artists of the same period, who did not court public approval, and can be described as Realists, Winslow Homer and Thomas Eakins. The comparisons should make for an interesting session!

#### Italian Group - Clive Jones

Two meetings were held at the Poulton Library on 10th and 24th January. The membership number is still strong and increasingly so as a result of recent interest shown in offering beginners' level Italian learning. Consequently, from our meeting onwards we are running a 30-minute beginners' session from 10.30 a.m. at the Poulton Library before the main group session starts at 11.00 a.m. This facility was advertised at the U3A monthly meeting on 12th January. Members wishing to take up this facility should contact the group leader without delay and are also most welcome to attend the main session as well. Our next two meetings will be on 7th and 21st February. We continue to study articles on various aspects of Italian life and culture and for learning exercises we have completed the section on pronouns before moving onto prepositions next time out. Recent articles included the Italian brick oven used for cooking pizza, the history of the city of Venice and two articles on the celebration of the Chinese New Year Festival which took place recently, one of which also included details on Feng Shui. From our next meeting onwards, we will be moving onto new sources of cultural and literary (story book) articles. There was also plenty of very good general conversation in Italian on a variety of topics.

#### The Challenge AI Poses

Can or should we trust in computers to make decisions or at what point is it considered sensible to have a human in the loop?

Computers use data and knowledge to learn but would never be able to use experience or belief or understanding. Can we consider this restriction to be safe?

Briefly explain what philosophers mean by the mind body problem. Is there a philosophical view on consciousness (which is obviously related to free will) that you find convincing?

Lots of discussion ensued.

As previously reported the Group did not meet as usual in December but instead visited the LCC Library at Lostock Hall. While acting to provide a library service for the local community it is also the store and distribution centre for play sets and librettos. We were warmly welcomed and spent an interesting hour selecting play sets for future reading, in all over twenty plays were selected. On the way home we called at Barton Grange for an enjoyable lunch.

The November meeting saw the end of the reading of "The Five Wives of Maurice Pinder".

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday, 21st February when we will start to read Habeas Corpus by Alan Bennett.

#### Poetry for Pleasure - Ann Fewson

Winter and Christmas poems for December enabled us to revisit some old favourites for this time of year but also to be introduced to poetry we didn't know previously. This session with its wide variety of seasonal poetry was enjoyed by us all.

Our January meeting was especially good with our focus on some of the characters from The Canterbury Tales as depicted by Chaucer in The Prologue. What is very obvious is that, although written more than 600 years ago there is so much relevance even now in Chaucer's portrayal of the strict divisions in society between the clergy, the nobles and the common peasant class. "Plus ça change, plus ces't la meme chose" Chaucer's satirical writing reveals so much hypocrisy in those who should know better. The 21st century behaviour we despair of is nothing new.

## **Science and Technology** - *Graham Topping*

We had a record turnout for the first meeting of the group in 2023. Forty-five members attended a talk by David Grimes on "The great importance of dangerous UV solar radiation". David's presentation was in two parts.

The first dealt with the role of sunlight, specifically part of the UV radiation, in the production of the various forms of glucose by plants from water and carbon dioxide with the aid of chlorophyll as a catalyst. In addition to the production of oxygen, an important by product of photosynthesis was Vitamin D. David took us through the chemical process of how Vitamin D was formed.

The second part dealt with the important role Vitamin D played in activating our immunity which protects us from viruses and bacteria. It was essential for us to have a good blood level of Vitamin D and how the lack of it may have played a part in the deaths of some Covid patients. No one with a blood level of greater than 40 ng/ml had died from Covid 19. He stressed that as we got older our ability to produce this vitamin by exposure to sunlight decreased significantly and that to maintain our blood level we should be taking daily doses of this vitamin in tablet form. When guestioned as to the daily amount of Vitamin D to be taken by the elderly he considered 1000 to 3000 units (equivalent to 25 to 75 ug) was an appropriate level. It was clear from the Q&A session that

Over the last two sessions we have watched the film 'Parallel Mothers', by the director Pedro Almodóvar which came out in 2021. As with most of his films women are the main characters and this film deals with two single mothers who meet while giving birth. They are different in age and attitude towards the future, the older one excited and optimistic, the younger one much more apprehensive. The plot deals with the growing relationship

between them as well as the more historical and political theme of excavating the mass graves of those murdered in the civil war in order to identify the victims and allow their family members to give them a dignified burial. After the film we had a group discussion about these themes, particularly about truth and secrecy and whether it is always good to uncover the truth.

There will not be a meeting in February so the next meeting is on Wednesday, 1st March.
