With this garden there was a distinct difference between the front and rear garden. So, it is important to agree on who has which. What about when something needs changing? We have been to a few members' gardens where waterflows cause problems which need sorting or letting it form a pond.

One thing brought up was about tall trees. Did you know that, if you have a tree in your garden it is important to know how tall it is and how far away from your house it is? Why? If the tree is tall enough to hit your house if it falls down, your insurance may not cover the damage. This is why it is important to know what trees you have and, if they can grow tall, they need constant pruning or pollarding.

Another subject can make a big difference to everyone's garden is how to improve our soil. At this time, with all the icy weather, it is ideal to dig up the soil, leave it in blocks and the freezing action will have a great effect on breaking down the clods and weed roots for when spring comes. Perhaps what saved Gillray was that he was an equal opportunities offender, no public figure was safe, but there is such wit and sly detail in his work that even his targets were amused. We briefly looked at some of Gustave Courbet's large-scale paintings in which he claimed himself to be at the centre of French society. Certainly a huge egotist, yet

he shocked French art out of Romanticism and into Realism.

Portrayals of Middle Eastern life is our next subject, beginning with Persian painting and then concentrating on European paintings from the 19th Century. These Orientalists have come under criticism lately, as they have been accused of taking a 'colonialist' approach, so this is an interesting discussionpoint.

## Science and Technology - Stephen Fewster

At the January meeting Geoffrey Cowell delivered an updated version of the talk he gave at the very first meeting of the Group in 2011, about Graphene. In 2011 this was quite a new product with a local link because two lecturers at Manchester University had recently received a Nobel Prize for their research on the substance.

It is an Allotrope of carbon, as is Graphite and Diamonds and is a single atom thick material which is many times stronger than steel, very much lighter and conducts electricity as well as copper does.

The talk covered developments in the production of the material, the uses to which it has been put and the financial effect on the companies involved. There was also a revision session on covalent bonds incorporated into the talk.
