I will now get right down to business, and this is concerning our membership fees and the way forward for our u3a. These issues with the *proposed options* will be raised at the March meeting.

#### Membership Fee

Option 1. Membership fee to rise to £25.00 a year equalling 48 pence a week. There will be a cap on any room hire at £1000.00 a year.

Option 2 Membership fee of £20.00 a year, equalling 38 pence a week, and a cap on any room hire at £500.00 a year.

Both will include reduction of year length, (for one year only) and staying at The Ashley.

For a lot of our members the due date is rather confusing and not everyone is certain when the due date is. To help make this very clear for everyone involved, the committee have thought very hard about this and feel that the due date should be the same as the start of any new tax year, i.e. April. Members would still get three months grace in which to pay their membership fee. If the membership fee is not paid by the end of June, this would mean that our member desires one of two things.

- 1. They no longer wish to be a member, or
- 2. They have not been able to renew their membership in the grace time.

This is not a problem. They will be welcomed to rejoin at any time which suits them.

The issues will be raised for voting at the April Special meeting, to be held at The Ashley.

I have decided to organise a giant beetle drive to raise funds for our u3a. See below in *Dates for your Diary* for detailed information. Jean and Alan Steel, and Cindy Potter will be running the drive, Pauline Powell will be selling tickets at the meeting in March, the fabulous Carousel are catering, and The Ashley are hosting. Please support it if you can.

Twenty-nine Amblers met at the Wyre Nature Reserve car park (at the end of Jameson Road, past the tip and the water treatment plant) at 10.30 a.m. We crossed the Nature Reserve in a Northerly direction and passed new riverside housing before crossing the swing bridge at the channel entrance to the Wyre Dock.



We then turned right opposite "Freeport" to join the riverside footpath bordering Jubilee Quay.

A look at the newer wrecks in the dock preceded a walk around parts of Fleetwood town with talks on the quays, the structure and layout of Fleetwood and its parks, and the three lighthouses with their significance by Ken; and the railway history by Jim, terminating at The Three Lights for lunch, after which we return through the Nature Reserve (without crossing the swing bridge again) to our cars.


We had a lovely meeting in February with a couple of newer members joining our group. Our theme this month was shadows, and we hope you enjoy our selection of varied paintings.


