

At 10.00 a.m.. on a damp Thursday 26th of October, 19 Amblers set off from the main car park (the former Garstang Town railway station site) following Geoffrey Cowell Pied Piper style along the River Wyre footpath. Leaving the river path to pass the site of the old Garstang bus station, we crossed the

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Passing the Greenhalgh Castle ruins where a very detailed notice board has been erected, we arrived at Greenhalgh Castle Farm, an old building built soon after the castle itself was part destroyed on the orders of Oliver Cromwell. We turned right down a lane and over a stile into a soggy field (a fact verified by one Ambler) then through a second similar field and over canal bridge 56



follow the Lancaster canal towpath. After about 12 minutes, we came to the ornate aqueduct over the River Wyre 34 feet below! After using the towpath to pass opposite The Old Tithebarn (formerly host to a local Masonic lodge) we emerged onto Moss Lane

and returned via Garstang centre – where a tentative query established that a party of 17 could not be victualled on Market Day – whence we disassociated to enable Amblers to return home or find sustenance where they could.

Thank you Geoffrey for your ready expansion of the Blue Plaque historical knowledge of this interesting old town.

Our November 23rd Amble sees us take the no.75 bus (10.11 a.m. Thornton Centre, 10.20 a.m. from Poulton) to get off at CHAIN CAUL WAY to meet at The Beach Hut PR2 2FS – parking nearby if preferred – and start at 11.00 a.m. prompt walking along the River Ribble to Avenham and Miller Parks with lunch at The Continental. Bus passengers can then return from the centre of Preston, or car users retrace their steps.

His murderous past eventually caught up with him, but in a short life of 38 years he changed painting forever.

He brought an immediacy and theatrical drama to religious and mythological subjects, using ordinary people from the street. He quickly caught their poses and expressions without using any under-drawings. Added to all these innovations was his masterly use of shadow and darkness.

In November, we will look at his last works, which reflect his attempt to obtain the Pope's pardon. Then we will consider his influence on such artists as Rubens, Gentileschi, Georges de la Tour, Velasquez and Manet.

Science and Technology – Geoffrey Cowell At the meeting held on Monday 16th October, Dr Malcolm Lewis gave a talk entitled " The

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Social Construction of Workplace Conflict: Bullying in the NHS.

Malcolm spent time at the beginning of his talk explaining that it was based on his own research. To begin, what is bullying? Most of us can recognise it and may even have suffered from it. It can occur at all stages of our lives and a common factor is that the bully is frequently in a more senior position, with the opportunities to cause a range of stressful situations, for the person being bullied. This can occur from early in our lives from school days, right through to being elderly.

He then talked about how his research looked at those who had perhaps been bullies in their early lives but did not carry on as bullies as adults. Then at those who became bullies in the workplace, usually when in a position of some seniority.

He talked about the very wide range of NHS employees that he had interviewed as part of his research. The majority nurses from junior to senior grades. He clearly had no difficulty in finding employees willing to talk about their experience of being bullied. To interview individuals who would admit to being bullied was more difficult, few like to admit to being bullies. One who did excuse it by saying that it was the only way to get a particular individual to work. Clearly someone directing the work of another may have to be assertive and where is the dividing line between this and bullying.

Many he interviewed accepted that a degree of bullying went with the job and people are affected in different ways.

Attempts to predict an individual who might become a bully were not easy. Altogether a fascinating talk in an area of research most of us had no experience of.

We later had examples of literature now being displayed in NHS workplaces on this subject (not produced by Malcolm).

At our next meeting, to be held on Monday 20th November, James Morgan will give a presentation on "The Technology behind Elmlea Cream Alternative".

This month's presentation was about a truly spectacular fly-drive adventure in the United States of America given by Claire and Bryan Fretwell, who are regular members of and

presenters to the Travel Group. They have visited the USA countless times, visiting many areas of this vast landscape. They have both friends and relatives there to call on. Therefore, they were able to speak with considerable authority and knowledge of the country and its history, culture and people. They also met up with a lot of very interesting people as the journey unfolded and anecdotes thereof. Our journey takes us from Manchester airport to the USA via Paris Charles de Gaulle. Watercolours - Christine Cutts



Although I handed over to Ann in mid-October, we together produced this report for the November Newsletter.


From now on, Ann will be your contact person on behalf of the group. Her contact details are now in the Group Meetings Schedule in pages 11 and 12 which follow.
